their lifesaving skills if and when someone calls on their help. Bridé 3 & Ms. Gammell's 1st Years all received their 'Adam's Gift' certificates.




Maths Week



An external catering company 'The School Food Company' came into the school and now provides a wide variety of lunches each day. The Student Council met with the caterers on multiple occasions to discuss food options and pricing. This information was then passed on to each year group so that all students became familiar with the new system.

During the Easter Holidays in March, Áine, Kai and I were lucky enough to be able to attend the Irish Second-Level Students' Union's AGM in Liberty Hall, Dublin, accompanied by our Student Council liaison teacher, Ms. McDonnell. On the 23rd April, 51 students and 6 teachers travelled to Paris for a cultural visit of the city. We flew from Cork airport to Charles de Gaulle. We were picked up by Gent our lovely driver and we didn't waste a minute. We headed straight for the Eiffel Tower and then a guided tour of Paris. We saw all the sites and learned a lot about the history of the city. We learned that the "New Bridge" (Le Pont Neuf) is the oldest bridge in the city, we learned that the Louvre was once home to the Kings and Queens of France, that Louis XIV was the Sun King, that the Eiffel Tower was sold twice for scrap metal and that French drivers are fearless. TY European Studies Trip to Berlin












TY Buddy System

Basketball






