

German Exchange



St. Patrick's Comprehensive welcomed German students from Lichtenfels in Bavaria in September.

St. Patrick's Comprehensive School and the Meranier Gymansium in Lichtenfels established a student exchange programme in 2005. The purpose of the programme is to provide an opportunity for both Irish and German students to learn their respective languages, to integrate into the local way of life and to experience facets of the local culture.

This year a group of 22 German students and 2 accompanying teachers spent a week in our school. Apart from attending classes and observing the Irish school system, the German students took part in school excursions to Bunratty Castle, Craggaunowen, a treasure hunt in Galway organised by our TY students and a bonding day in Derg Isle Team Building Centre.

The exchange programme has proved a very rewarding experience for participants: the challenge of learning a new language, living with a host family and adapting to a new culture, presents students with a unique experience from which they will derive lifelong benefits.

We extend our wholehearted thanks to the host families for their ongoing support of this valued programme.

'Nationwide' Visit

In February, the RTE 'Nationwide' team visited our school. The episode was based on the history of Shannon town and featured a segment on St Patrick's Comprehensive, including interviews

with our Principal Mr Heaphy and Mr Diarmuid O'Donovan who was the first Principal of St. Patrick's Comprehensive School.





LCA Bonding Trip to Spike Island


Musical

Student Reflections


By Shane Quinn - First Year

These brilliant, brave and enthusiastic students undertook many tasks in their fundraising efforts, including bag-packing, waxing and being waxed, gathering sponsorship from all around the community and they topped off their efforts by sky-diving from a height of 10,000 feet at the TandemSkydive club in Longford. The impetus to do all this was to show solidarity with fellow students, Michael and Olivia Hartigan whose 7 year old brother, Liam, died last year following an asthma attack.



Ms Power commended the students and explained just how important their fundraising is. In Ireland, on average, one person a week dies from Asthma and with government funding to the charity having been cut by 50% in the last few years, efforts such as those made by St Patrick's Comprehensive are now more necessary than ever.

Staff and students alike were delighted to meet Ms Power. They were impressed with her passion and genuine commitment to raise awareness and reduce suffering for asthmatics and their families. As an asthmatic herself, the former Senator is well aware of the plight of sufferers. As she addressed the students she spoke about the society's efforts at lobbying Government to bring down the cost of medication and informed them about the many practical uses the Asthma Society will have for the funds raised.

A sincere thank you from the staff and students of St Patrick's Comprehensive goes to all those that helped these students in their efforts.


Texaco Art Competition Winner







St Patricks Comprehensive's Young Innovators' trip to San Francisco

Seven budding innovators from St Patrick's Comprehensive School enjoyed a celebratory trip to San Francisco and Silicon Valley after their recent victory in the 2nd ITLG Young Innovators competition held at Shannon Airport. The competition saw them compete against 800 students in a nationwide competition to come up with a concept for an invention that would be useful in the next 50 years. Their idea for a microchip to monitor your health and warn of early onset of any health conditions proved to be a winning one and earned them an all-expense paid trip to Silicon Valley and San Francisco.

During their trip to Silicon Valley the students took part in a tour of cutting edge technology companies such as Intel where they took part in a classroom training exercise and got a chronological tour of the company's many innovations in technology. The group also took a behind the scenes tour of the Google campus and got an in-depth look at the working conditions that Google's 30,000 employees enjoy. The students also visited the Tech Museum of Innovation in San Jose where they enjoyed many hands-on activities such as robot building, Jet-pack simulator, glider design, cracking security passwords, lock picking and earthquake simulator.

After the three day tour of Silicon Valley, the group headed to San Francisco and experienced the many sights the city has to offer. The iconic steep streets of San Francisco were explored in the bus tour of the city which included the many districts of the city which are home to the most expensive real-estate in America.

The students also visited the legendary Alcatraz Prison which is a short ferry trip from the city and took a step back in time to experience what prison life was like on "The Rock". No trip to San Francisco would be complete without a visit to the iconic Golden Gate Bridge and students took the opportunity to walk across this famous landmark and take in the many views it has to offer.

The seven students enjoyed their trip to Silicon Valley and San Francisco thanks to their innovative idea and courtesy of the many sponsors of the competition, in particular their hosts, John and Helen Hartnett of the ITLG. The founder of the ITLG John Hartnett believes "The technological age & what we do in the future will be driven largely by the young people of today. This event may well light a flame for some of the technology innovators and entrepreneurs in the future". Perhaps the innovative talents of these students will lead them back to Silicon Valley to seek their fortunes in the future and shape the future of technology.

After 'some' training Comp U 19's finally got their first game as they came up against a strong outfit in Rice College from Ennis.




During a hotly contested back and forth contest in Lees Road, Comp prevailed in our first game.
