SCHOOL TRANSPORT

WHO IS ELIGIBLE?

Children who reside at least 4.8 kilometres from and attending their nearest school are eligible for post primary school transport.

Application forms should be submitted before Friday 26th April 2013. **WHAT IS THE CHARGE?**

The current 2012/13 annual charge is €350 per child with a family maximum of €650

CAN I SPREAD THE PAYMENT OVER THE SCHOOL YEAR?

Payments may be made in two instalments in July and September.

ARE SOME CHILDREN EXEMPT FROM PAYING?

Yes. Eligible children i.e.children residing at least 4.8 kilometres from and attending their nearest school, who hold valid medical cards (GMS scheme), do not pay.

German Students visit "The Comp"

We were again delighted to welcome a group of 19 Bavarian students and 2 teachers who took part in another successful German exchange with our school during September.

St. Patrick's and the Meranier Gymnasium in Lichtenfels established a student exchange programme in 2005 with the purpose of providing an opportunity for both Irish and German students to learn their respective languages, to integrate into their way of life and to experience facets of the local culture.

The German students not only attended classes and experienced the Irish school system but also enjoyed excursions to Bunratty Castle, Craggaunowen, Dromoland Castle, Quin Abbey, the Cliffs of Moher and the Burren. The exchange programme has provided a very rewarding experience to participants: the challenge of learning a new language, living with a host family and adapting to a new culture, presents students with a unique experience from which they will derive lifelong benefits. School authorities are also indebted to the host families for their ongoing support of this invaluable programme.

HOMEWORK AND STUDY ROUTINE

From the beginning of the school year it is necessary to build-in a routine of homework/study time. You will need to discuss, agree and negotiate this with your parents.

Establishing a realistic routine, early in the school year, will make a huge difference to the effectiveness of your work. Like most jobs, study is mainly a matter of habit. Once settled in a routine, life becomes much simpler and study becomes more productive. Making out your own schedule, based on your particular circumstances, will act as a helpful structure for your work. While quality is ultimately more important than quantity, in first year you should be aiming to do between one and two hours of productive study each day. This includes homework, revision, and any study sessions in school.

Create a study timetable - construct a weekly schedule for yourself. Start by including your class times, travel, sports and other commitments. Then add designated study periods for the afternoons/evenings and for the weekend. It is better to start with realistic targets that you can meet, rather than being over-ambitious at first.

Have a definite **time for starting study** each evening. Pick a time that you can stick to. It will reinforce your discipline and condition your system to make the most of the session.

Stick to your weekly schedule as closely as possible – it will become a help to your efforts and a shield against temptation. You'll still be able to socialise, rest and

Tips to Manage On-line Social Networking

While children embrace new technologies, parents face new challenges to protect them. Complicating matters is that many parents know little to nothing about these ever-changing technologies. Fortunately, there are many resources to educate and support parents on these new technologies.

What are web-based social networks?

Social networks are on-line gathering places where young people meet, make new friends, and gossip. Two very popular sites are www.myspace.com and www.facebook.com.

What's a blog? Why would anyone want to blog?

• Blogs are web journals or diaries.

Blogs allow young people a way to post their feelings, their opinions, to share personal interests, to express themselves.

What's the risk?

- Young people may innocently post too much personal information and pictures placing them at risk for on-line predators.
- There is no face-to-face interaction, so it may not seem real to kids that anyone can view or share their information. Youthful postings could impact getting on or staying on sports teams, getting into colleges, and even future jobs.

Parenting tips:

- Keep the computer in a central family location and limit screen time.
- Communicate your expectations to your child regarding their on-line postings and communications. Establish a parent child contract outlining agreements about on-line conduct. (See www.wiredsafety.org for an example.)
- Ask to view your child's personal site if he or she is resistant, use this as an opportunity for discussion. If your child continues to refuse to allow access and you suspect that your child is posting inappropriate or risky information, you can search for your child's site by entering name and/or school. In either case, strive for an open discussion.
- Talk to your children about how they can limit others access to their personal pages.
- Remind your child that everything written online can be permanent and can be easily forwarded. Explain that even young people have been charged with making terroristic threats.
- Regularly read your child's postings and check the recent history.
- Discuss cyber bullying talk to your child about not participating in it by writing, sending, or forwarding hurtful communications.
- Take advantage of the parental controls provided by your operating system or Internet provider.

Consider installing software that will assist you with monitoring your child's on-line activity. There are many different types of software that can filter, block, or track computer use.
