Visit to Besançon, France, Oct 2013.

Fourth Year French students have recently returned from a very successful visit to their exchange partners at Lycée Jules Haag, in Besançon, France.

The group of 16 pupils with 2 teachers, made the journey via Dublin/ Lyon and onwards by train. On arrival, they were greeted by their French counterparts and immediately whisked away to settle into their French homes for the duration of their stay.

A very full programme of events had been prepared by our French partners in Lycée Jules Haag, which included mornings attending school, followed by various activities in the afternoon and evening. These included a 'jeu de piste' where students had to find historical landmarks in the city, visits to the local bowling/karting club and a visit to the Citadel, the 17th. Century fortress which overlooks the city and is now a UNESCO World Heritage site.

As part of the cultural exchange our pupils put on a display of Irish song and dance and were soon joined by the French group in a rousing chorus of *The Galway Girl* and *My Lovely Rose of Clare*. The French group were quickly stepping it out to *The Siege of Ennis* and *An Droelin*.

After a somewhat shy start, communication was quickly established and our pupils were soon speaking French and seeing the very real value in studying the language.

Apart from developing their oral skills, firm friendships were formed and everyone is looking forward to the return visit by the French pupils in Spring 2014.

STUDY GUIDE

Hint: Start with the subjects you dislike. Spend more time on them. Your favourite subjects will be easier.

Basic study guide

- Read and make use of your notes, this is simple enough but if this method of study doesn't make things stick, don't do it for the sake of it maybe copy key points on small revision cards, this breaks down revision into more digestible chunks. You can get excellent **revision notes** on mocks.ie
- Make use of diagrams and draw out your own.
- Get friends and family to test you on what you have taken in. This will help you keep your mind alert and to see what you have remember.
- Practise exams using past exam and sample papers to get used to the questions and the timing. If you don't already have them you can download past papers from <u>www.examinations.ie</u>.
- Above all, stay active. Do not study longer then 20 minutes at once, your brain will stop taking in information.
- Exercise has been proven to help. In your breaks do some exercise to limber up for your next session of revision.

CHOOSING LEAVING CERTIFICATE SUBJECTS

As students work their way through Transition Year, or Junior Certificate Year (if they do not take Transition Year), they are faced with choosing the subjects that they will take for their Leaving Certificate cycle. Parents and students sometimes express the fear that students may rule themselves out of some third-level college courses by failing to choose the right subjects.

However, Leaving Certificate subject choice is not as full of pitfalls as people might imagine, and what follows is a rough guide. Most students take seven subjects for the Leaving Certificate. All students must choose a mixture of subjects, including "core" subjects and some optional choices.

All students take Irish, unless they have grounds for being exempted. Generally speaking, they take English also. Most students will take another language, usually a modern European language, although the range of languages is increasing.

With a number of exceptions, students who apply to honours degree courses of the National University of Ireland (NUI) must present Irish, English, and another language. However, the exceptions to the NUI third-language requirement are increasing, and students without a third language should check the individual course requirements carefully.

The "three-language rule" does not apply to other universities or to the institutes of technology. Trinity College Dublin requires applicants to present English and another language, as does the University of Limerick. One language will satisfy the requirements of most institutes of technology.

Mathematics is an entry requirement for practically all courses in many third-level colleges and colleges of further education. Students are usually advised to take one laboratory science subject.

A very small number of courses require two laboratory science subjects, such as medicine and dentistry in Trinity College and in University College Cork or the five-year medical degree in Royal College of Surgeons in Ireland (RCSI). NUI Galway, RCSI, or University College Dublin (UCD), will accept one science subject for entry to their six-year medical programmes.

Chemistry is essential for Veterinary Medicine in UCD, Pharmacy in Trinity, and Human Nutrition and Dietetics, the degree course jointly taught by DIT Kevin St and Trinity. Chemistry is also specified as one of the two laboratory sciences necessary for medicine, dentistry or pharmacy in UCC. Chemistry is a course requirement for the five-year medical degree programme in UCD and RCSI. A business subject is rarely an essential requirement for business or commerce at third level, although many students choose one from Accounting, Business or Economics because they enjoy the subject. The five most frequently required subjects are: Irish, English, a third language, mathematics, and a laboratory science subject.

One of the main aims of the competition is to enable students to use their German outside the classroom and to gain a deeper understanding and knowledge of the German culture and language. We are very proud of our students and encourage them to keep up their German debating skills.

CAO Applications

Before you fill out your CAO form:

• Make an appointment with your Career Guidance teacher in the next two weeks and go through your choices and options. It is still not too late to ask for prospectuses for different colleges or call the college / university of your choice and ask them to talk to you about the course. You can usually download the university or college prospectus from the university website.

 \cdot Make sure to check the basic entry requirements for the courses you're interested in. This information will be in the prospectus. For example, the National University of Ireland has some language requirements and some courses require a certain results in Maths, as well as the necessary points.

 \cdot Take your personal self into consideration – would you be happy living away from home to complete your chosen course? If not, there may be a similar course at a nearer college / I.T. / university to your home.

When filling out the form:

1. Put aside an hour and concentrate solely on completing the form.

2. Applying online on www.CAO.ie is cheaper than the paper application and is less prone to errors. If you are applying online get someone to look over the application before you finalise it. But if you are applying offline, make a photocopy of each one and get a teacher / parent to check that everything is filled in properly before you post them off. The advantage of the online system is that it will flag a course code used in the wrong list or an invalid course code. It will also flag the common error of using the current year in the date of birth entry.

3. When filling in the CAO make sure to put the course you really want to do as first choice NOT what you think you'll have the results for. The order in which you fill in your choices is THE MOST IMPORTANT step in the process. Choose your course in the order of preference - put your dream course at the top and assume that you are going to get 600 points.

4. Make sure and include a low point's course somewhere on the list as a fallback option.

5. Make sure to apply for the DARE and HEAR scheme, if eligible. (See www.accesscollege.ie) It's worthwhile double checking what you've put on the form. Then you can treble check your course choices when you get the Statement of Record from the CAO which lists the courses you have put down on your application. It's worth remembering that you are not pinned down to the choices you list this month you can also use the change of mind facility up to 5.15pm on July 1.
